What is Operation Helping Others?

There are over 5,000 GMEC members signed up to participate in Operation Helping Others (OHO). If you are one of those members, thank you! If you are not familiar with OHO, here is an overview of the program.

OHO is a voluntary program that rounds up your electric bill to the next dollar and uses the change as a donation. OHO is not a program to pay Guernsey-Muskingum

electric bills. Funding comes entirely from members who voluntarily participate. The small change donated by members makes a big difference in our communities. For example, the OHO committee would put Willie Wiredhand's 56 cents in with all of the spare change donated by other members and decide how best to use those funds in our communities. Every penny raised by your donations to OHO goes toward funding needs in our community. The OHO committee consists of one appointed volunteer from each district. In 2018, your OHO committee granted **\$30,204.09** to be distributed to needy causes in our community. Below is a list of OHO recipients for the year.

Stop scammers in their tracks

1. Never give out or confirm confidential, personal, account, or financial information over the phone to non-cooperative personnel. GMEC will never demand that type of information over the phone. If in doubt, hang up and call GMEC at the number printed on your bill: 800-521-9879.
2. If you believe you are being scammed, collect as much information about the situation as possible, including the phone number the scammer asks you to call back, and report it to the co-op or local police.
3. If you have any questions about your payment or bill status, please call the number on your bill. Remember that scammers can make their caller ID look like it is GMEC calling, so you must dial 800-521-9879 to ensure safety.
4. Never let anyone claiming to be a GMEC employee into or around your home without asking to see their company-issued ID.
5. Do not meet up with anyone to make an electric bill payment. Payments should only be made by mail, in person at the co-op office, or over the phone via the toll-free number: 844-206-7873.
6. If a caller specifically asks you to pay using a prepaid debit card, cash, or money order, this is a red flag.
7. If you feel pressured to make a payment or decision in a rush, hang up. That is a sure sign of a scam.
8. Be wary of emails or text messages demanding payment or asking for confidential information. If it looks suspicious, contact the office to verify.
