Like my electric bill, I am sure your electric bills were plenty high enough in July, August, and September as the dog days of summer seemed to last forever, and the air conditioners were humming day and night.

The good news is that increased sales over the past few months have helped the co-op's finances. But what does that do for members? First and foremost, it enables your co-op to keep the lines clear and the power flowing — because that isn't cheap. We will spend nearly \$3 million in 2016 alone just in right-of-way work to keep power lines clear so outages can be minimized and service remains reliable.

Perhaps the best news is that a "healthy bottom line" helps us keep rates stable. You may not realize this (and some may call me a liar) but the rates that most of our members pay today are lower than the rates charged in 2012! Yes, I said LOWER. Our current residential members pay \$3 per 1,000 kilowatt-hours less than they did four years ago. In addition, we've had temporary rate reductions during that same period. So, if your summer bills were higher, it was due to the greater use of that "hungry" AC unit, not a rate increase.

Evenings are cooler now, and I'm happy to sit in the swing and enjoy the soothing sounds of nature. It seems that the squeaking springs are simply one more instrument playing along with a symphony of insects. Before long, the cold breath of winter will send me from the porch to the warm embrace of my recliner. Where does time go?

As you prepare for Thanksgiving, may God bless each of you and your families. May your tables be abundant with food and your hearts be full of love and gratitude. \otimes



WEATHER STRIPPING DOORS

Capturing Energy Savings by Sealing Air Leaks

Save energy and seal air leaks by weather stripping exterior doors. How do you know if you need to weather strip? If you can see any amount of light between the door frame and the floor, weather stripping should be applied to eliminate energy waste. This DIY energy-saving project is relatively easy and inexpensive depending on the type of materials selected. The most common weather stripping material is self-adhesive foam strips, although rubber, vinyl, metal, or a combination of materials may also be used.

CLEANING SURFACES - Clean the door and door jamb to be weather stripped. For best results, weather stripping should be applied to clean, dry surfaces above 20°F.



MEASURING DOOR & DOOR JAMBS - To ensure greater accuracy, measure your space twice before cutting the material. It is best to plan for one continuous strip for each side of the door and door jamb.



CUTTING FOAM - Cut long pieces of self-adhesive weather stripping material (foam, vinyl, etc.) for each side of the door jamb and door.



APPLYING WEATHER STRIPPING - Peel back the self-adhesive foam. Apply one continuous strip of material snugly along each side. Make sure the weather stripping meets tightly at the corners and is pressed firmly onto the door and door jamb. The material should compress tightly between the door and door jamb, without making it difficult to shut.
