Digital devices can have a *big impact* on energy use

AH, THE DIGITAL AGE. We have gadgets galore, the ability to manage our homes in new and innovative ways, brilliant images and captivating sounds of modern entertainment options, and of course, the Internet. Clearly, digital devices reign supreme. But these cool new capabilities come with a couple of pitfalls: “vampire” loads and the issue of “technology reincarnation.”

Over the course of the Digital Age, electricity use has continued to increase. Families have multiple televisions, computers, cellphones, gaming devices, and cable or satellite boxes.

Major appliances aside, most digital devices do not use 120-volt power, which is the standard voltage of a home outlet. They actually use a lot less. So trying to plug your brand new smartphone directly into an outlet is going to lead to a fried device. This is why low-voltage devices come with a power adapter. These “wall warts,” as some term them, take the 120-volt electricity supplied by Guernsey-Muskingum Electric Cooperative and convert it to, say, 5 volts. Unfortunately, most folks leave their adapters plugged in to make recharging easier. The problem is that the seemingly innocuous wall wart uses power even when it isn’t charging a device.

This invisible energy consumption is often called a “vampire” load. Studies show that 5 to 10 percent of the average home’s energy use is from vampire loads, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. The only way to stop this is to unplug

the power adapter when it is not in use or employ smart power strips. These look like the typical power strip but with a twist -- only one socket gets power all the time. When the device or appliance connected to it turns on and starts using power, the remaining sockets receive power, too. This is perfect for home entertainment systems, computer setups, and a variety of other situations.

Technological advances have steadily increased energy efficiency and reduced purchase prices. This sounds like a good thing, but when replacing a product at the end of its life, the tendency is to go bigger and continue to use the old tech -- technology reincarnation.

For example, flat screen television prices have plummeted as technology has evolved, and so has the amount of electricity they use. Consumers wander into the big-box store and are dazzled by walls of giant, brilliant televisions. What they used to pay for the paltry 32-inch model now might net them a 50-inch giant. And who doesn’t want to see their favorite show or sports event in near-life size? But if you spring for the bigger TV, you won’t benefit from the increased energy efficiency of the newer technology. The bigger model uses as much juice as the older, smaller TV, which likely ends up in another room — “reincarnated” in another setting — still using power. This often happens to refrigerators, which end up reincarnated in garages or basements.

I’ll offer a couple words of advice to help you avoid, or at least reduce, the effects of vampire loads and technology reincarnation. Invest in smart power strips or make a point to use outlets where you can conveniently unplug power adapters when the devices plugged into it are not in use. Don’t oversize your replacement appliances and entertainment gear, unless family needs dictate the larger capacities. And recycle the replaced appliances and equipment to stem technology reincarnation. You will enjoy the Digital Age for a lot less money. ☺

Co-op notes, rebates, and discounts

Geothermal heating/cooling system — \$300 rebate

We have a \$300 rebate to help pay for the most efficient underground heating, cooling, and hot water system available. To be eligible, the geothermal unit must be ENERGY STAR-rated and have a radio-controlled switch installed on the unit and on your electric water heater of at least 40-gallon capacity. Over 280 GMEC members are using geothermal.

Dual Fuel — \$300 rebate

If you install a new add-on electric heat pump with a fossil-fuel backup and have an electric water heater of at least 40-gallon capacity, you are eligible for a \$300 rebate. Radio-controlled switches are required to be installed on both the heat pump and water heater. Please call your cooperative for details. Over 880 GMEC members are using Dual Fuel.

Cool Returns — \$100 rebate

Are you having central air conditioning installed or a new electric heat pump with electric resistance heat backup? Allow your cooperative to install a radio-controlled switch and receive a \$100 rebate check. Over 150 members are participating in Cool Returns.

Water heater with sediment hole

The 4-inch hole in the side of our tank is great for cleaning out sediment. This rebated tank is available for free delivery. We also have \$50 or \$100 checks to send you if you purchase a tank somewhere else. Give us a call for details.

Water heater installation available

If you purchase your water heater from GMEC, our member services technician, Tim Fisher, will install your water heater for an additional charge. Give us a call.

Radio-controlled switch

What a deal! If you don't already have a radio-controlled switch for your electric water heater of at least 40-gallon capacity, please call and Tim Fisher will install one FREE. Over 5,300 GMEC members have a switch on their water heaters. This entitles you to a discount and free maintenance (except cleaning), including parts and labor, on your electric water heater. Some exclusions apply; call us for details.

GenerLink™

We want you to use your portable generator safely. Call the member services department at GMEC and ask them about GenerLink. GenerLink eliminates the use of extension cords and other connections that can be dangerous to members and linemen.

Meter reading

You can enter your meter readings online at our website, www.gmenergy.com. And, as always, you can mail your readings or call us 24 hours a day with meter readings.
